4-H Livestock Testing Program

Getting involved in the livestock testing program is easy. It is a GREAT way to improve your livestock knowledge, help you excel in showmanship classes, and improve your portfolio.

- Open to youth in 3rd – 12th grades. Club leaders/parents have asked if they can participate too. Although it would be "just for fun" and not for awards, the answer is YES.
- Youth are tested each month on a specific chapter of their 4-H livestock resource manual. Manuals available for purchase from the 4-H office. This is a great way to use your Clover Bucks!
- Come to the 4-H office to take the test on any day the office is open from the 15th through the end of the month.

- To be eligible for a medal, compete in at least three months of tests for the same species.
- Youth are tested on the livestock species of their choice: swine, beef, sheep, dairy, or goats.
- Each test has about 15 questions. Most youth drop by after school and complete a test in about 10 minutes.

AWARDS:

- Each participant's high three test scores for a specific species will be totaled.
- The top three youth in EACH species in EACH grade division (junior, intermediate, and senior) will be honored at the Weber County Fair. **What a GREAT way to impress your buyer!**

- 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards include gold, silver and bronze medals and premiums of \$15, \$10 & \$5 respectively.

Upcoming Workshops & Camps

Robotics Camp: Youth in 3rd-5th grades, and their parents/leaders, are invited to attend robotics camp. All equipment will be provided. Campers will learn how to build and program robots using Lego Mindstorms software, programming with the Pilot Program. *Campers will complete camp with the skills needed to excel in the county 4-H Robotics Contest on June 12. Saturday, January 10, 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. Fee: \$20 per camper, or \$10 per camper if adult attends camp with them. Register by January 2.* Space limited to 12 adult/youth teams.

Sewing Workshop for Youth: Come learn sewing skills and make an outfit to enter in the fashion revue contest in March! Participants will make pajama bottoms during the first workshop and a pajama top the next. Participants may attend one day or both. Limited seats available so sign up early! Youth will need to bring one adult for every two or three youth. Cost is only \$1 per person and a list of supplies needed will be provided at sign up. *Thursday, January*

15th from 4:30-7:30 p.m., and Thursday, January 22nd from 4:30-7:30 p.m., at the Extension office. Register by January 8th.

Wow! Weber 4-H is offering lots of great workshops and camps to help you gain the skills needed to excel in our county contests! Both youth and parents/leaders are invited to attend.

Interview Workshop: Youth in 6th – 12th grades are invited to attend this two-hour workshop to develop their interview skills. In life, and 4-H, you will be participating in all sorts of interviews – scholarships, jobs, leadership roles, National Congress interviews, etc. Come learn how to best showcase your accomplishments so you can ace your interview! *Friday, January 16, 9 a.m. – 11 a.m. (school's out). FREE. Register by January 12th.*

Demonstration Workshop: Youth in 3rd – 12th grades, along with leaders and

parents, are invited to attend this two-hour workshop to learn how to plan and deliver a GREAT demonstration. This workshop will not only help you excel in the county's 4-H demonstration competition in April, but you will also gain skills that will help you excel at school, church, and other community events. *Friday, January 16, 1 p.m. – 3 p.m. (school's out). FREE. Register by January 12th.*

Robotics Camp: Youth in 6th– 12th grades, and their parents/leaders, are invited to attend robotics camp. All equipment will be provided. Campers will learn how to build and program robots using Lego Mindstorm software, programming with the Inventor Program. *Campers will complete camp with the skills needed to excel in the county 4-H Robotics Contest on June 12. Saturday, February 7, 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. Fee: \$20 per camper, or \$10 per camper if adult attends camp with them. Register by January 30.* Space limited to 12 adult/youth teams.

On Going Workshops

4-H Horse Study Night: Youth in 3rd- 12th grades, and their parents/leaders, are invited to attend 4-H Horse Study Nights. Sessions are held on Monday evenings (excluding holidays), at 7 p.m. at the Extension Office. During these sessions, youth learn all about horses through various games, presentations, quizzes, and hands on activities.

- Youth **DO NOT** have to be a member of a 4-H horse club, **DO NOT** need to own a horse, and **DO NOT** need prior knowledge of horses – just a desire to learn!
- This is a great way to learn more about horses and gain knowledge and skills

that will help you excel on horse exams, horse bowl and horse judging contests. These sessions are led by Connie Neal, Linda Gaz and Kathy Capell.

4-H Livestock Judging Practice: Youth in 3rd- 12th grades, and their parents/leaders, are invited to attend 4-H Livestock Judging Practices. Sessions are held every other Thursday (excluding holidays), at 6 p.m. at the Extension Office. During these sessions, youth learn how to judge swine, sheep and beef animals and give oral reasons for their placings.

- Youth **DO NOT** have to be a member of a 4-H livestock club, **DO NOT** need to own an animal, and **DO NOT** need prior knowledge of livestock – just a desire to learn!
- This is a great way to learn more about livestock and gain knowledge and skills that will help you excel in the county livestock judging contest, livestock bowl contest, and livestock tests. These sessions are led by Rena Steed.

Youth are encouraged to purchase a livestock judging manual (\$4 at the 4-H Office) prior to attending. Call the 4-H Office to sign up.

New 4-H Contest Program Continues

With more than 20 county contests, Weber County 4-H has lots of opportunities for members to showcase their skills!

Read the specific contest guidelines at www.webercounty4-H.org (go to 4-H contests).

January – Healthy Cuisine Contest:

Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or team of two. Youth plan a nutritionally balanced meal, purchase the supplies, prepare, and serve a dinner for two judges, and clean up within a one hour time limit. **January 29, 4:00 p.m. or 5:30 p.m. (two sessions), location at Orion Junior High. MUST be registered by January 22.**

January – Chef Extraordinaire Contest:

Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual or team of two. Youth plan and prepare a nutritionally balanced meal, and serve the dinner to four guests (chosen by the contestant) and a judge. Youth must prepare, serve and clean up within a three hour time limit. **If you're interested in participating contact Naomi at 399-8206. If space allows we will conduct this contest on January 29.**

March – Fashion Revue Contest:

Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth sew a garment and model it for the judges. Judging includes clothing construction, modeling, fit, confidence, and poise; and how well they respond in an interview process. All participants model their garments for the audience during the culminating 4-H Fashion Revue. **March 19, 6:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by March 12.**

March – Fashion Consumer Strategies Contest:

Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual only. Youth select an outfit, model the outfit for a panel of judges, and share decisions made in selecting

the outfit. The member will consider three outfits when making their selection and demonstrate decision making skills in selecting the most suitable of the three. **March 19, 6:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by March 12.**

April – World of Work Contest: Eligibility: Grades 9-12. Individual only. Youth prepare a resume, complete an application, and participate in an interview to evaluate their job readiness and interview skills. **April 2, 6:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by March 26.**

April - Video Production Contest: Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual or team of two. Youth shoot footage, edit and produce a video, present their final product to the judges, and participate in an interview about video production. The finished product can either be VHS or DVD. **April 2, 6:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by March 26.**

April – Entrepreneurship Contest: Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual or team of two. Contestants will present a business plan concept to a panel of judges. The concept should include the idea for a business, the purpose, target market, name, and idea of the finances needed to begin the venture. Youth may choose to present an idea for a proposed business, or an actual business they have started. **April 2, 6:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by March 26.**

April – Dairy Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge a class of dairy cows and give oral reasons for their placement. **April 16, 6:00 p.m., at the Fairgrounds. MUST be registered by April 9.**

April – Livestock Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge livestock (sheep, swine, and beef) and give oral reasons for their placement.

April – Speech:

- **4-H Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth research, write, and present an original speech. The speech should relate directly to the participant's 4-H experience. Youth are not allowed to use visual aids for their speech.
- **Horse Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-8. Individual or teams of two. Youth research, write, and present an original speech on a topic appropriate to the horse industry. Youth may not use visual aids for their speech.
- **Impromptu Public Speaking Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 6-12. Individual only. Contestants will give a speech on a randomly assigned topic.

April 23, 6:00 p.m., at Orion Junior High School. MUST be registered by April 16.

April – Demonstration Contests: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or team of two. Youth research, write, and present a demonstration. Members use posters and visual aids to “show” to show the steps.

- Horse Demonstration Contest
- Quilting Demonstration Contest
- 4-H Demonstration Contest (all other subject areas including foods)

For all demonstration contests:

Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual or team of two. Youth research, write, and present a demonstration. Members use posters and visual aids to “show” the steps. **April 23, 6:00 p.m., at Orion Junior High School. MUST be registered by April 16.**

More 4-H Contest Programs...

May – Bowl Contests:

- **Horse Bowl Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth compete in a quiz bowl with horse-related questions.
- **Livestock Bowl Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth compete in a quiz bowl with livestock-related (beef, swine, and sheep) questions.
- **Consumer Bowl Contest:** Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual only. Youth will compete in a quiz bowl contest answering questions related to the Consumer & Family Science curriculum area, including foods and nutrition, financial management, clothing

and textiles, consumer decision making, and child care.

May – Horse Judging Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Individual. Youth learn to judge a class of horses and give oral reasons for their placement.

June – Robotics Contest: Eligibility: Grades 3-12. Teams of two-four youth only. Participants build and program a robot using Lego MindStorm® kits to achieve the assigned challenges within the time limit. Laptops, software and robotics kits provided. **June 12, 4:00 p.m., at the Extension office. MUST be registered by June 5.**

State Junior Livestock Shows & Utah State Fair

Utah offers many state-sponsored junior livestock shows. All of these shows are governed by the Utah State Junior Livestock Show Association Rules. The rules are posted at www.webercounty4-H.org (go to Featured Programs > Junior Livestock). ***It is very important to follow the rules carefully; non-compliance can result in disqualification, forfeiture of sales money, and/or criminal prosecution.***

TAGGING DEADLINES:

- To be eligible to show at any of the state Junior Livestock Shows, or to show at the Utah State Fair, your animal must be tagged with a state tag (*this is different from the Weber County Fair tag*).
- The tagging deadline for state shows **differs** from the Weber County deadline. To be eligible to exhibit a project animal at a Utah State Junior Livestock show or the Utah State Fair show, the minimum tagging deadline is beef (100 days); swine and sheep (60 days).
- All animals should be tagged on the Weber County tagging dates in May/June. However, if you plan to participate in the Spanish Fork, Delta or Vernal Shows (which have an earlier tagging deadline), you will need to have

your animal tagged before the regular county tagging.

NUMBER OF ANIMALS TAGGED: Utah rules state, "Exhibitors may tag **ONE** extra animal per species for each show period." Youth will declare which state show the animal is being tagged for at tagging.

ENTRY FORMS: The entry forms for each show are available from the 4-H office, and also posted on the county website. Please note that the Uinta Basin (Vernal) show utilizes a different entry form.

- Entry forms for state shows must be post-marked no later than 30 days prior to the show.
- The animal must be tagged and the entire entry form completed (listing the tag number and exhibitor) before the 4-H Extension Agent will sign it. The agent's signature verifies that the animal is an eligible project animal and was tagged the minimum days required.

CODE OF ETHICS: State rules provide detailed guidelines for the feeding, care, and fitting of animals. As an exhibitor you are held accountable for knowing

and following these rules (posted on county website), and are subject to the consequences of non-compliance. Membership privileges can be revoked for both 4-H youth and 4-H leaders for unethical behavior.

AUCTION: You may show your animal (excluding hogs) at more than one show; however once your animal goes through the auction at any show, it is no longer eligible to be exhibited in any show.

- Morgan County Junior Livestock Show, Morgan: June 6
- Kamas Valley Junior Livestock Show, Kamas: June 27
- Southeastern Utah Junior Livestock Show, Ferron: July 8-11
- Utah State Fair, Salt Lake: September 17-19

Need \$100?



Weber County 4-H has kicked off its 2008-09 4-H Alumni Identification Contest. Our

goal? To identify as many adults living in Weber County who were 4-H members as children. Why? *The purpose of this contest is: 1) to increase the pool of potential judges for county 4-H contests, 2) to prepare for the upcoming 100th celebration of Utah 4-H, and 3) to reconnect with our alumni and keep them informed of the exciting growth that is happening in Weber County 4-H. Identified alumni will occasionally be invited to judge county 4-H contests, receive an alumni newsletter, and be informed of alumni activities. **Alumni WILL NOT be solicited for donations.***

CONTEST ELIGIBILITY: Any Weber County 4-H member (grades 3-12) is eligible to participate in this contest.

CONTEST PRIZE:

- The member who identifies the most 4-H alumni will receive a \$100 Life Skills Incentive.
- If the member identifying the most alumni does not identify at least 25

alumni, no cash award will be presented.

- If two or more members tie in the number of alumni they identify each will be awarded the \$100 Life Skills Incentive (again, no cash award will be presented unless the member identifies at least 25 alumni).
- A Life Skills Incentive can be used:
 - * to buy any resource that supports the member in his 4-H project (camera, art supplies for an art project, horse supplies for a horse project, livestock equipment for a livestock project, etc.).
 - * to pay for any 4-H event (such as State Contests, TLT, JYC, Aggie Camps, National Round Up, etc.)
 - * to buy any resources from the 4-H office (manuals, t-shirts, enrollment fees, etc.)

GUIDELINES: The rules are simple:

1. Ask every adult you know if they were a 4-H member when they were a child.
2. If they were, have them **completely** fill out an alumni identification form. Alumni forms are available from the 4-H office. Under the question, "Year in 4-H", we are asking for which year (for example:

1978-1980) not the number of years.

3. Write your full name and club name on the back of the form (so we know who gets "credit" for identifying the alumnus). Forms submitted without a member's name will not be "credited."
4. Return the completed alumni registration form to Wendy Rees, 4-H Office Specialist as soon as possible after the form is completed. The 4-H office will send the alumnus a letter and a alumni car decal.
5. Only adults who currently live in Weber County may be counted. It doesn't matter which state they lived in when they were in 4-H as long as they now live in Weber County.
6. **Only one person will get "credit" for identifying the alumnus – no half credit/no shared credit.** The first person submitting the completed registration form to the 4-H office will receive the credit.
7. Alumni already identified will not count.
8. The contest starts now and will continue until October 15, 2009.

News for Senior 4-H'ers

SENIOR PORTFOLIO COMPETITION: All senior 4-H youth (9-12th grades) are encouraged to submit their portfolios in state competition and compete for an opportunity to attend National 4-H Congress. To participate in state competition, update your portfolio and re-submit it to the 4-H office by January 15. You must complete a new entry form; all sections should be updated to

include experiences and activities up through January.

4-H SCHOLARSHIPS: Utah 4-H has many academic scholarships available. All of the scholarships must be used to attend USU's Logan campus, except the Utah 4-H Horse Scholarship, which can be used at any accredited college. The scholarship requirements and applications are posted on the state website at

utah4-H.org.

Scholarship packets are due to Donna at the 4-H office by January 15. The packet must include: Application, Scholarship Recommendation by School Principal or College Instructor, Scholarship Recommendation by County Extension Agent or Local 4-H Leader, Portfolio, Personal Statement, and Official School Transcript.
